### **Floor Schedule and Procedure**

- **Suspension bills:** Today, the House will consider six bills on the Suspension calendar. Bills considered on the Suspension calendar are debatable for 40 minutes; may not be amended; and require a two-thirds vote for passage. If recorded votes are requested on any Suspension bills, they will be postponed until 6:30 p.m.

**1. H.Res.61** - Observing and celebrating the Birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr., and encouraging the people of the United States to celebrate the Birthday of Martin Luther King Jr., and his life and legacy (Rep. Lewis (GA) – Oversight and Government Reform)

**2. H.R. 188** - To provide a new effective date for applicability of certain provisions of law to Public Law 105-331 (Reps. Pallone, Frank, Frelinghuysen, Sires - Financial Services)

**3. H.R. 391** - To authorize the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development to continue to insure and enter into commitments to insure home equity conversion mortgages under section 225 of the National Housing Act (Rep. Matheson - Financial Services)

**4. H.Res. 39** - Commending the University of Florida Gators for their victory in the 2006 Bowl Championship Series (BCS) and for winning the national college football championship (Rep. Wasserman Schultz - Education and Labor)

**5. H.Con. Res.31-** Honoring the Mare Island Original 21ers for the efforts to increase equal employment opportunities in the military (Rep. George Miller - Education and Labor)

**6. H. Res. -** Commending the Boise State University Broncos football team for winning the 2007 Fiesta Bowl and completing an undefeated season (Rep. Simpson - Education and Labor)
